### PARKS AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES

Lacey Township is the home of five major parks and eight smaller tot-lots with playground areas and benches. All park, tot-lot and beach facilities are maintained by the Lacey Township Department of Public Works. For your enjoyment, please visit as often as you can.

- Home to Lacey Girls Softball, Lacey Soccer and Lacey Girls Lacrosse
- ~ 4 lighted softball fields and 4 soccer fields
- ~ 4 tennis courts and 3 pickleball courts
- ~ 3 volleyball courts and one basketball court
- ~ Two roller hockey rinks and skate park
- 1 mile perimeter walking path and exercise equipment station
- ~ Newly installed tot-lot and playground
- Picnic pavilion with grills and picnic tables (with power)
- ~ 2 restroom facilities within the park

#### **HEBREW PARK**

- ~ Located on Manchester Ave. and Cedar Ave.
- Home to Lacey Soccer and 3 full-sized soccer fields with field lighting available on two fields.
- ~ 1 lighted softball field, 1 basketball court and 3 pickleball courts
- Timber picnic shelter and picnic grove with many tables (Pavilion has power)
- ~ Tot-lot and playground area
- 7 mile perimeter walking path and exercise equipment station
- ~ 2 restroom facilities within the park
- ~ Provides summer recreational camp

#### **CLUNE PARK**

- ~ Located off of Beach Boulevard
- Home to Lacey Little League, AYF Football and Lacey Boys Lacrosse
- 3 lighted little league fields, 2 50/70 fields, 1 regulation sized baseball field, and 3 full-sized lighted football fields
- ~ Tot-lot and playground area
- ~ 2 restroom facilities within the park
- ~ Provides summer recreational camp

#### **HUFFY WALLIS PARK**

- ~ Located off Parkside Drive
- ~ Township's oldest park
- ~ 1 softball field and 1 basketball court
- ~ Upgraded tot-lot and playground
- ~ Provides summer recreational camp

#### **BAMBER PARK**

- ~ Located off Good Luck Road
- ~ Softball and soccer fields
- Newly renovated basketball court and 2 tennis/pickleball courts
- ~ Newly installed tot-lot and playground
- ~ Tot-lot and playground area
- ~ Picnic area and bathing beach open to public

#### FORKED RIVER BEACH BAY FRONT PARK

- Located at eastern end of Beach Boulevard along Barnegat Bay
- ~ Park was recreated after the destruction of Hurricane Sandy
- ~ 2 tot-lots for ages 2-5 yrs and 5-12 yrs and accessible handicap swing
- ~ Large pavilion with benches and tables
- ~ Exercise equipment area with 16 seperate pieces
- Over 1/3 mile walking path with views of Barnegat Bay and benches to rest
- Observation/overlook platform providing views of the bay and Barnegat lighthouse

#### **MEZERA PARK**

- ~ Located off Lakeside Drive South
- ~ 2 playgrounds for ages 2-5 yrs and 5-12 yrs
- ~ Scenic views of Barnegat Lake, Lacey's largest lake

#### **ASH ROAD PARK**

- ~ Located at Basin and Ash Roads
- ~ Tot-lot and Playground

#### LAKE BARNEGAT BEACH

- ~ Located on the north shoreline off of Lakeside Drive

### DEER HEAD LAKE (3rd Lake)

- ~ Excellent location for sunset viewing
- Home of Recreation events throughout the summer season, such as movie nights and concerts

#### **CEDAR LAKE (1st Lake)**

- ~ Located along Parker Avenue
- ~ Not open to swimming, but excellent for fishing
- ~ Home of the yearly Fishing Derby
- ~ Newly renovated lighted basketball court
- ~ Parking area provided

#### **ENOS POND COUNTY PARK**

- ~ Located at the eastern end of Lacey Road
- Passive park with a large collection of native and rare Pine Barrens plants
- ~ Tot-lot and playground area
- ~ Picnic tables and park benches
- ~ Restrooms available within the park
- ~ Maintained by Ocean County Parks Department

### **SPRING LEAF COLLECTION – 2 CYCLES**

THE 1ST CYCLE BEGINS MONDAY, APRIL 17<sup>TH</sup> AND THE 2ND & FINAL CYCLE BEGINS MONDAY, MAY 1<sup>ST</sup>

**LEAVES** are Mandated Recyclable in the State of NJ, Ocean County and Lacey Township. They are **PROHIBITED** from being **LANDFILLED**.

### **THE RULES:**

- ⇒ Place your leaves at curbside <u>prior</u> to the FIRST DAY OF EACH CYCLE.
- ⇒ Leaves must be bagged in biodegradable brown paper bags, or placed in containers no larger than 32 gallons.
- ⇒ No tree branches, acorns or other debris LEAVES ONLY.
- ⇒ If we come to your street and your leaves were not out on the first collection cycle, we will not be back until the <u>Next Cycle</u> begins.
- ⇒ It takes the Public Works Department about 2 weeks to complete each cycle.

After the 2nd Collection, Residents are required to bring their leaves into the Recycling Center during normal operating hours.

RESIDENTS PLEASE NOTE: If you are bringing leaves into the Recycling Center in plastic bags. you must empty the bags in the leaf pile and take the empty bag(s) with you for disposal at home. If you are bringing the leaves in biodegradable BROWN PAPER BAGS, leave the bag(s) with the leaves in the leaf pile.

You may bring branches from tree trimming and also shrubs, place these items loose (not tied) in the Brush Pile. (We do not accept trees, stumps, root balls or invasive shrubs such as bamboo or poison ivy/poison oak.)

Leaves brought in at this time will be composted and brush will be ground down into mulch and ready for you to pickup in the Spring, just in time for you to get your garden started.

CONTRACTORS and LANDSCAPERS can bring Leaves and Brush to the Ocean County Facilities in Manahawkin or Lakewood or to other private companies for disposal. They may charge a fee, so check first.

WE DO NOT ACCEPT GARBAGE, GRASS, TREES, TREE STUMPS, GRAVEL, DIRT, WOOD CHIPS OR ANY INVASIVE SHRUBS OR VINES SUCH AS BAMBOO OR POISON IVY IN THE RECYCLING CENTER AT ANY TIME FROM ANYONE.

IT IS ILLEGAL DUMPING AND SUBJECT TO VIOLATION AND PENALTIES.





### MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the Lacey Township Municipal Alliance Committee is to work with the Police, Schools, Community Groups and businesses to provide community members with quality programs which educate our citizens about drug, alcohol and tobacco abuse and misuse. Part of this mission is also to provide a coordinated approach to advocacy, collaboration and education to promote wellness among all age groups and to keep individuals and families healthy and safe.

### **PURPOSE**

The Lacey Township Municipal Alliance Committee is a coalition of citizens from the business, church and school community as well as members of local organizations. Alliance members work together to develop, plan, and implement programs and activities, which will assist in the prevention of alcohol, tobacco and other drugs (ATOD).

The Alliance receives funding from several sources including the State of New Jersey, through Drug Education Demand Reduction (DEDR) funds, the Township of Lacey and local donations from businesses and private citizens.

The State of New Jersey provides half of the funding for the Alliance through a grant from the Governor's Council on Alcoholism and Drug Abuse. Lacey Township matches the grant through 25% cash match and 75% as an In-Kind (goods and services) donation.

### **MESSAGE FROM THE COORDINATOR**



The amount provided through **DEDR** funding to the Alliances continues be drastically reduced throughout the state. However, due to the success of the Lacey 5K Race, we've


been able to subsidize our programming at nearly the same levels.

Even though the DEDR funding has been cut, we were able to secure a grant from the Division of Mental Health and Addiction Services, known as DMHAS. The money can only be used towards providing programs for Youth Prevention Coalitions. Since we already have them at the Middle and High School levels, we were able to launch one in the Mill Pond School for 5th and 6th Graders, led by Student Assistance Counselor, Kelly Brown. This will expose children at a younger age to prevention messages and help them develop resiliency skills to help reinforce positive behavior.



In April, along with the Recreation Department, we sponsored a Family Fun Walk at Gille Park in April. We added an activity we called "Chalk the Walk" which encouraged students to write positive messages

all along the walking path. It was exciting to see what they came up with! We will definitely include this in our Calendar of Events for 2023.

P.S. In March of 2022 we were very saddened the passing of Mayor Nick Juliano. Although he was a Township Committeeman and Mayor we remember him as a dedicated member of the Alliance. He spent many of his Friday nights volunteering as a chaperone for

our Teen Dances as well as helping with many other activities. Nick was a kind and caring family man who just wanted to help others and always supported the mission of the Alliance.

#### **TASK FORCE**

The Task Force was created in 2012 in response to the increasing numbers of deaths due to drug overdoses in our community. Our focus has been to raise awareness and develop strategies to prevent the use and misuse of alcohol as well as various illegal substances. As we resumed our meeting schedule in 2022, our discussions have been concerned with the health of our community especially regarding our youth.

The School District, the Police Department and the Recreation Department have all expressed concerns about the impact of social media and peer pressure on the behavior of some of our students, as well as parent's reluctance to hold their child accountable for their actions.

Officials cite an increase in negative behavior towards authority figures as well as an uptick in vandalism on public property. This now begins at younger ages with students in 5th and 6th grade acting out when they are in larger groups. The Task Force is planning on sponsoring a "Walking in the Park" program to help curtail vandalism at Gille Park on weekdays after school dismissal in the spring.

The Scholarship Committee places a heavy emphasis on community involvement during the selection process. The scholarships are not funded through the grant but rather from fund-raising activities such as our 5K Race. The Alliance awarded seven scholarships totaling \$4,200 to Hope DeWitt, Abigail Fulton, Patrick Liebmann, Katie Patterson, Brennin Smith, Trent Stanfield and Declan Vidal.

### FALL LEAF COLLECTION - 3 CYCLES

### THE 1<sup>ST</sup> CYCLE BEGINS MONDAY, NOVEMBER 13<sup>TH</sup> THE 2<sup>ND</sup> CYCLE BEGINS MONDAY, NOVEMBER 27<sup>TH</sup> THE 3<sup>RD</sup> & FINAL CYCLE BEGINS MONDAY, DECEMBER 11<sup>TH</sup>

LEAVES are Mandated Recyclable in the State of NJ, Ocean County and Lacey Township – They are PROHIBITED from being LANDFILLED. THE RULES:

- ⇒ Place your leaves at curbside <u>prior</u> to the FIRST DAY OF EACH CYCLE.
- ⇒ Leaves must be bagged in biodegradable brown paper bags, or placed in containers no larger than 32 gallons.
- NO tree branches, acorns or other debris LEAVES ONLY.
- ⇒ If we come to your street and your leaves were not out on the first collection cycle, we will not be back until the Next Cycle begins.
- ⇒ It takes the Public Works Department about 2 weeks to complete each cycle.

After the 3rd Collection, Residents are required to bring their leaves into the Recycling Center during normal operating hours.

RESIDENTS PLEASE NOTE: If you are bringing leaves into the Recycling Center in plastic bags. you must empty the bags in the leaf pile and take the empty bag(s) with you for disposal at home. If you are bringing the leaves in biodegradable BROWN PAPER BAGS, leave the bag(s) with the leaves in the leaf pile.

You may bring branches from tree trimming and also shrubs, place these items loose (not tied) in the Brush Pile. (We do not accept trees, stumps, root balls or invasive shrubs such as bamboo or poison ivy/poison oak.)

Leaves brought in at this time will be composted and brush will be ground down into mulch and ready for you to pickup in the Spring, just in time for you to get your garden started.

CONTRACTORS and LANDSCAPERS can bring Leaves and Brush to the Ocean County Facilities in Manahawkin or Lakewood or to other private companies for disposal. They may charge a fee, so check first.

WE DO NOT ACCEPT GARBAGE, GRASS, TREES, TREE STUMPS, GRAVEL, DIRT, WOOD CHIPS OR ANY INVASIVE SHRUBS OR VINES SUCH AS BAMBOO OR POISON IVY IN THE RECYCLING CENTER AT ANY TIME FROM ANYONE, IT IS ILLEGAL DUMPING AND SUBJECT TO VIOLATION AND PENALTIES.

### Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

#### Dispose of yard waste properly

- Keep leaves and grass out of storm drains.
- Use leaves and grass clippings for compost.
- Use a mulching mower that recycles grass clippings into the lawn.

#### Be a green boater

- Obey no wake zones and other navigational aids.
- Use pump-out stations and vessels, and don't discharge raw sewage into open waters.
- Use non-toxic, biodegradable materials when cleaning, repairing and maintaining your boat.
- Collect paint chips, dust and residue and dispose of it in the trash.



### Properly use and dispose of hazardous products

- Do not pour household or commercial cleaning products, including lawn and garden care products, motor oil, antifreeze and paints, down storm drains or into open water.
- Properly label and store hazardous products.
- Use natural or less toxic alternatives when possible.
- Recycle used motor oil.
- Contact your municipality, county or facility management office for the locations of hazardous-waste disposal facilities.

#### Take action and be part of the solution

Stormwater pollution is one of Barnegat Bay's greatest threats. By sharing the responsibility and making these small, easy changes in our daily lives, we can keep common pollutants out of stormwater. It all adds up to cleaner water in the Bay and saves the high cost of cleaning it up once it becomes dirty.

# Solutions to Stormwater Pollution

Actions You Can Take to Protect and Restore Barnegat Bay

#### Why does Barnegat Bay need our help?

Long appreciated for its great aesthetic, economic and recreational value, an array of human impacts now threaten the health of Barnegat Bay.

Pollution on streets, parking lots and lawns is washed by rain and snow melt into ditches, storm drains, streams, rivers and ultimately, Barnegat Bay.

This stormwater pollution is one of Barnegat Bay's greatest threats to clean water and the rivers and creeks that drain into it. Fertilizers, pesticides, motor oil, animal waste, detergents, grass clippings, yard waste and litter are all examples of stormwater pollution.

#### Limit your use of fertilizers and pesticides

- Do a soil test to see if you need to fertilize.
- Use a drop spreader to apply fertilizer.
- Sweep up fertilizer from pavement and other hard surfaces after applying.
- Do not apply fertilizers if heavy rain is predicted.
- Follow the instructions on the bag label for correct application procedures.
- Try alternatives to pesticides, such as plants that repel insects.
- Properly store fertilizers and pesticide.
- Landscape your property using native vegetation and plants.

#### Clean up after your pet

- Never discard pet waste in a storm drain.

#### Don't feed wildlife

 Do not feed ducks, geese, or other forms of wildlife in public areas.

#### Don't litter

- Place litter in trash receptacles and keep it out of storm drains.
- Reduce, re-use and recycle.
- Participate in community cleanups.



### SOLID WASTE COLLECTION AT CURBSIDE

### Chapter 289 of the Township Code of the Township of Lacey

PREPARATION All garbage and rubbish containing food waste shall be kept in leak-proof, commercially available containers with tight-fitting lids or covers and shall be kept covered at all times, unless the contents of same are being removed or contents are being placed therein. Plastic bags or any receptacle which does not fit the above description shall not be used for garbage and rubbish containing food waste; and if so used, garbage and rubbish container therein shall not be collected.

CONTAINER SIZE 32 gallon containers with a lid and serviceable handles. Containers may not be more than 32 gallons in size due to the fact that garbage collection is done manually.

**COLLECTION** Containers must be placed at curbside or adjacent to the road if no curbs exists, in a place which is visible and easily accessible for collectors, either the night before or by 6:00 am on the day of collection and removed within 24 hours after collection. The contractor is not required to come back and pick up your garbage if it is set out late and the truck has already passed through your area.

Solid Waste Services include the following:

**FURNITURE AND BEDDING** Residents are allowed to dispose of 2 furniture pieces per week on regular collection days, preferably the second collection day, as the first collection days are usually very heavy, especially in the spring and summer months. Mattresses and box springs can be put out for collection, provided it is not raining. If it is raining or there is a chance of rain, please cover the mattresses and box springs in plastic

**CARPET** Approximately 1 room per week (20 rolls max), preferably on your second collection day. Carpet must be tied and bundled no more than 4' in length weighing no more than 50 lbs, per bundle. Cover in plastic if it is raining or if rain is expected.

**LUMBER** Scrap lumber pieces can be tied and bundled no more than 4' in length, weighing no more than 50 lbs. per bundle. (2-3 bundles max) If pieces are small enough, you can put them in your trash can.

**RESPONSIBILITY** If your garbage has spilled over and onto the street prior to collection, it is your responsibility to clean it up. The contractor is not responsible for cleaning up garbage that has blown over and spilled onto the street or placed out in plastic bags and torn open by animals.

VIOLATION Any container that does not comply with the above specifications or creates a hazard or danger to the collectors shall be affixed with a red tag. In the event that a container is affixed with a red tag, it shall be a violation to utilize that container for future disposal of garbage, refuse and other rubbish.







WALL BOARD/PLASTER BOARD Only 3 cans or bundles per month weighing no more than 50 lbs. per bundle.

SLIDING GLASS DOORS, TEMPERED GLASS TABLES, MIRRORS Tape up the glass and wrap the entire surface in a heavy duty tarp or blanket, label it GLASS. It will get picked up with regular garbage on your second collection day.

**TOILETS** Seperate the tank from the bowl. It will get picked up with regular garbage on your second collection day.

APPLIANCES, METAL ITEMS, LAWN MOWERS, AC UNITS, BASKETBALL HOOPS, BBQGRILLS, LARGETVs Pickedup weekly. Please call the Public Works Dept. to schedule a pick up of any of these items. 609-693-1100, ext. 2301

The following items WILL NOT BE COLLECTED at all, it is up to Residents to properly dispose of these items, call the Public Works Department for information prior to setting them out at curbside.

- · House clean-outs
- Building and construction materials, fixtures, windows, etc, resulting from major alterations and renovations to properties by owners or contractor's, especially those that required a Building or Demolition Permit
- Concrete, brick, asphalt, asbestos
- Roofing shingles
- Tires and auto batteries
- · Paint, motor oil or antifreeze

- Propane tanks
- Trees, earth, root matter, stones and leaves
- Household Hazardous Waste including pool chemicals and fertilizers
- Mandated Recyclables please refer to Curbside Recycling Collection and/or Recycling Center information
- Electronics including Televisions
- Wood Pallets

It's impossible to list everything. When in doubt, call the Public Works Department first, this will save you time and a visit from the Code Enforcement Officer.



PREPARATION All mandated single stream recyclable items must—it is set out late and the truck has already passed through your area. be loose in cans. No bundles or plastic bags.

**CONTAINER SIZE 32** gallon containers with a lid and serviceable handles. Containers may not be more than 32 gallons in size due to the fact that recycling collection is done manually.

**COLLECTION** Containers must be placed at curbside or adjacent to the road if no curbs exists, in a place which is visible and easily accessible for collectors, either the night before or by 6:00 am on the day of collection and removed within 24 hours after collection. The contractor is not required to come back and pick up your recycling if

**RESPONSIBILITY** If your recycling has spilled over and onto the street prior to collection, it is your responsibility to clean it up. The contractor is not responsible for cleaning up recycling that has blown over and spilled onto the street or placed out in plastic bags.

**VIOLATION** Any container that does not comply with the above specifications or creates a hazard or danger to the collectors shall be affixed with a red tag. In the event that a container is affixed with a red tag, it shall be a violation to utilize that container for future disposal of recycling, garbage, refuse and other rubbish.


